

VOTING CRITERIA: ARE YOU ELIGIBLE TO VOTE?

You CAN vote if....

- You are a U.S. citizen
 - If you are a U.S. citizen living abroad, request an absentee ballot at travel.state.gov.
 - You can be a dual citizen and vote
- Meet your state's registry requirements
 - If you are homeless, you can still register to vote and vote. In place of a home address, it is recommended to put a shelter's address that you can receive mail from.
- Are at least 18 years old at the time of the election
 - If you are younger than 18, each state has their own regulations/process for PRE-REGISTERING
- Register to vote by your state's deadline. North Dakota is the ONLY state not requiring voter registration

You CAN NOT vote if....

- You are a noncitizen. This includes permanent residents (Green Card holders)
 - In very specific cases, non-citizens can vote in their LOCAL elections
- State varied conditions:
 - If you have been convicted of a felony, you MIGHT not be able to vote depending on your state's rules
 - If you have a mental disability, you MIGHT not be able to vote depending on your state's rules
